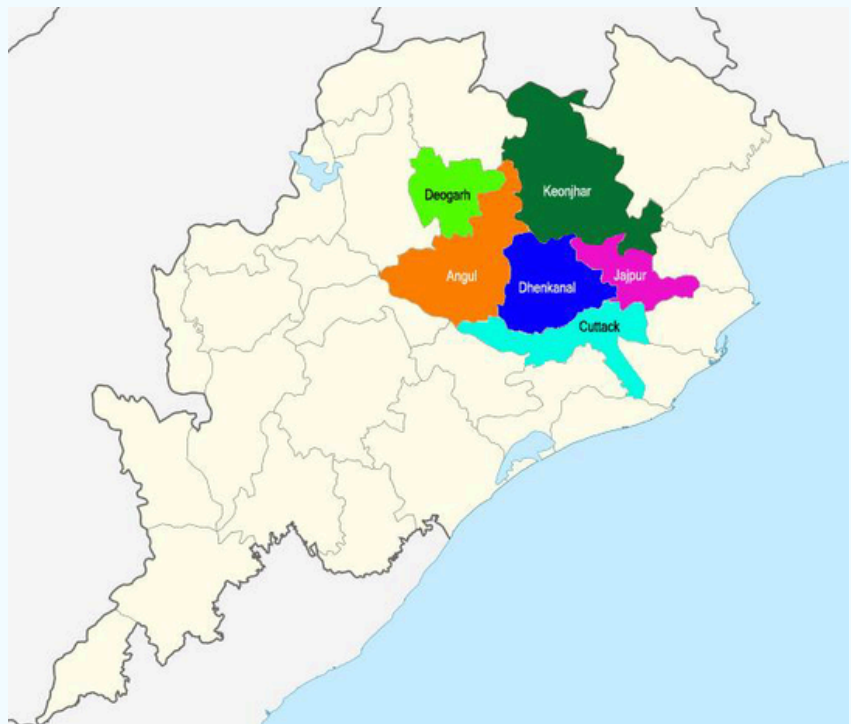

Kalinga Eye Hospital works to promote quality of life in rural communities through providing affordable eye care services on a sustainable basis.

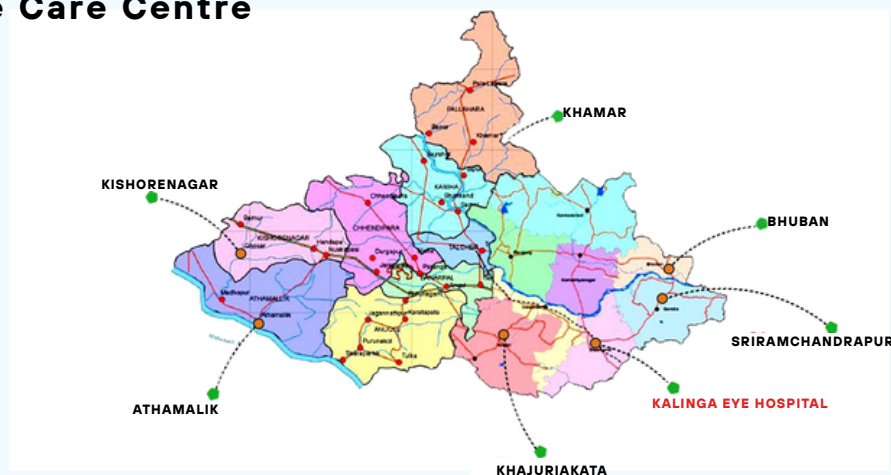
## Our Eye Care Network

## Activity Highlights 2024-25

### Illuminating Lives in Masuri, Koraput

On 3rd May, 2024, Kalinga Eye Hospital extended its mission to the remote village of Masuri in Koraput district, where access to quality eye care remained a challenge. In collaboration with Alekh Baba, a revered local organization, an eye screening camp was conducted to serve the underserved population. The enthusiasm of the community was evident as 220 individuals turned up for screening, each carrying a hope for clearer vision. Among them, 79 people received much-needed spectacles, enhancing their ability to work and engage in daily activities. Additionally, five individuals diagnosed with cataracts were scheduled for surgery, a transformative intervention that would restore their sight. This initiative not only provided immediate relief but also reinforced the commitment of Kalinga Eye Hospital in eliminating avoidable blindness in Odisha's most marginalized communities.



## Empowering Women: International Women's Day Celebration

On 8th March, 2025, Kalinga Eye Hospital, in collaboration with NYSASDRI, commemorated International Women's Day with a powerful awareness meeting. The event was designed to celebrate the invaluable contributions of women in healthcare while fostering discussions on gender equity in the workplace. Employees shared inspiring stories of resilience and dedication, emphasizing the crucial role women play in strengthening healthcare services. The session also highlighted the importance of women's eye health, shedding light on how societal and biological factors contribute to vision-related challenges among women. Through this meaningful event, Kalinga Eye Hospital reaffirmed its commitment to empowering women within the organization and in the communities it serves, ensuring that every woman receives the eye care she deserves.





## Bringing Clarity to ECHS Beneficiaries, Dhenkanal

The Ex-Servicemen Contributory Health Scheme (ECHS) campus in Dhenkanal became the site of a significant eye health intervention on 21st August, 2024. With an intent to serve those who have dedicated their lives to national service, Kalinga Eye Hospital conducted a comprehensive screening camp where 154 beneficiaries underwent eye examinations. Among them, 78 individuals were provided with spectacles to correct their vision, ensuring they could enjoy a better quality of life post-retirement. This initiative exemplified the hospital's deep respect for veterans and its unwavering dedication to providing them with the healthcare they rightfully deserve.



## Vision Care for Veterans: Eye Camp at Ex-Servicemen Multi-Purpose Cooperative Society, Angul

On 31st March, 2025, Kalinga Eye Hospital reaffirmed its commitment to veteran care by conducting an eye camp in association with the Ex-Servicemen Multi-Purpose Cooperative Society Ltd. in Angul. Seventy-six individuals attended the screening, where 27 were diagnosed with cataracts and referred for surgical intervention, while 35 others received refractive-corrected spectacles. These services ensured that those who once served the nation could continue to lead independent, fulfilling lives. The heartfelt gratitude expressed by the veterans and their families reinforced the profound impact of such initiatives, motivating the hospital to continue prioritizing elderly and veteran eye care.





## Serving the Legal Community: Eye Camp at Dhenkanal Court

From 17th to 19th September, 2024, Kalinga Eye Hospital set up an eye screening camp at the Dhenkanal Court premises, catering to the specific needs of the legal fraternity. Over three days, 245 lawyers and judges availed themselves of the screening services, highlighting the hospital's role in extending healthcare beyond conventional settings. The findings were eye-opening 103 participants required spectacles to correct their vision. By ensuring that those administering justice had the clarity of sight to perform their duties efficiently, Kalinga Eye Hospital once again demonstrated the far-reaching importance of its community-focused interventions.





## Children Eye Screening under the National School Eye Health Program

With the belief that no child should suffer from preventable blindness, Kalinga Eye Hospital, in collaboration with Sightsavers India, conducted an extensive child eye screening initiative at Joda, Keonjhar, from 22<sup>nd</sup> July to 25<sup>th</sup> July, 2024 under the National School Eye Health Program. As a continuation of last year's efforts, this program aimed at providing sustained care to schoolchildren in the district. During the four-day drive, 993 children underwent comprehensive eye examinations, out of whom 135 were prescribed, provided with spectacles and 4 children were provided with specially developed low vision devices. Addressing visual impairment in children is crucial for their academic and social development and this initiative reaffirmed the hospital's commitment to nurturing the next generation's eye health.





## Industrial Eye Health Initiative: KEC International Limited, Duburi, Jajpur

Industries are often hotspots for occupational eye health concerns, making eye care interventions crucial for workers. On February 9th, 2025, Kalinga Eye Hospital conducted a specialized eye screening camp at KEC International Limited in Duburi, Jajpur, catering to the vision needs of industrial workers. A total of 45 employees underwent screening and 30 were diagnosed with refractive errors, necessitating corrective spectacles. Additionally, 40 employees received ophthalmic medicines to address minor eye ailments, ensuring their eye health was safeguarded in their demanding work environment. Beyond diagnosis and treatment, all 45 workers were sensitized on eye safety measures, reinforcing the importance of proactive eye care in occupational settings. This initiative marked a significant step in promoting workplace eye health, ensuring that industrial workers continue to perform their duties with optimal vision and safety.



## **Illuminating Lives: Special Eye Camp on World Sight Day**

On 10th October 2024, Kalinga Eye Hospital, Dhenkanal, observed the World Sight Day with a heartfelt mission to bring vision care to those in need. A special eye camp was organized at Barihapur, Parjunga, Dhenkanal, with the primary objective of spreading awareness about preventable blindness and ensuring access to quality eye care services for rural communities. This initiative saw an overwhelming response, with 63 individuals stepping forward to receive a comprehensive eye screening.

For many, this camp was a ray of hope. Among those screened, 23 people received prescription spectacles, a simple yet life-changing solution to their vision impairments. Additionally, five individuals underwent cataract surgeries, restoring their sight and allowing them to regain their independence and productivity. The camp highlighted the significant impact of early detection and timely intervention, reinforcing the importance of accessible eye care services.

The success of this event was made possible through the relentless efforts of our dedicated medical team, volunteers and the unwavering support of the local community. By reaching out to underserved populations, Kalinga Eye Hospital continues to uphold its commitment in eliminating avoidable blindness and ensuring that no individual suffers due to a lack of medical resources. The smiles of those who regained their sight serve as a testament to our ongoing mission: to illuminate lives, one vision at a time.





## Vision at Work: Eye Camp at L&T, Dhenkanal Campus

Recognizing the importance of eye health among professionals, Kalinga Eye Hospital conducted a specialized eye camp on the 25th January 2025 at the Larsen & Toubro (L&T) campus in Dhenkanal. In today's digital age, prolonged screen exposure, workplace stress and inadequate eye care awareness contribute significantly to vision-related issues among employees. To address this, our expert medical team set up a comprehensive screening initiative, catering specifically to the workforce at L&T.

A total of 48 employees participated in the eye screening program, each receiving a personalized assessment of their ocular health. Among them, 15 employees were diagnosed with refractive errors and were promptly provided with prescription spectacles to enhance their vision and overall work efficiency. The camp not only offered immediate relief but also served as an educational platform to instill the importance of regular eye check-ups, ergonomic practices, and lifestyle modifications to prevent long-term vision problems.

Such collaborations between corporate organizations and healthcare institutions are vital in fostering a culture of proactive eye care. Kalinga Eye Hospital remains committed to expanding its reach, ensuring that every individual irrespective of their profession has access to high-quality eye care services. ## Vision Care Project

### Launch of Vision Care Project: A New Dawn in Community Eye Care

On the 1st July 2024, a remarkable milestone in community eye care was achieved with the launch of the Vision Care Project at the Kalinga Eye Hospital, Dhenkanal. This groundbreaking initiative, inaugurated by Shri Krushna Chandra Patra, Hon'ble Minister of Food Supplies, Consumer Welfare, Science and Technology, Government of Odisha, marks a significant step toward eradicating avoidable blindness in the region.

The grand event unfolded in the hospital's conference hall, attended by esteemed dignitaries, healthcare professionals and community leaders. Shri Sarangadhar Samal, Director of Kalinga Eye Hospital, warmly welcomed the guests and provided a compelling overview of the hospital's ongoing commitment to quality eye care. A special virtual address by Dr. Birajal Mehta, a distinguished ophthalmologist and Trustee of Shrimad Ramachandra Love and Care, highlighted the nationwide success of similar initiatives and the transformative impact they bring to communities.

The Vision Care Project aims to screen 300,000 individuals and distribute 65,000 pairs of eyeglasses over two years, ensuring that vision impairment does not hinder livelihoods and education. The Hon'ble Minister emphasized the crucial role of this initiative in making essential eye care accessible to underserved populations. The event also recognized Dr. Utkarsh for his outstanding contributions to community eye health. The ceremony concluded with a heartfelt vote of thanks, reinforcing the collective dedication of Kalinga Eye Hospital and its partners in creating a future where vision care is a right, not a privilege.







## The Need for the Vision Care Project: Addressing Preventable Blindness

In a world where clear vision is essential for education, employment and independence, millions still suffer from avoidable blindness due to a lack of accessible eye care. Recognizing this, Kalinga Eye Hospital, in collaboration with Sarvamangal Family Trust and Shrimad Ramachandra Love and Care, Gujarat, launched the Vision Care Project to extend quality eye care services to those who need them the most.

The statistics speak volumes by March 2025, 116,321 individuals were screened under this project and 28,235 free spectacles were provided to correct refractive errors. The Vision Care Project was born out of the need to bridge the gap between accessible eye care and the underserved rural population, ensuring that no one is left behind due to preventable vision impairment.

Our outreach teams wander remote villages, setting up camps and offering free screenings, making eye care services affordable, available and accessible. For many beneficiaries, this initiative is their first-ever eye check-up, uncovering hidden vision issues that could have led to permanent blindness if left untreated. Through sustained efforts and strategic partnerships, we continue to combat preventable blindness, restoring sight and transforming lives.



## School Eye Health Program

### Stakeholder Meeting: Strengthening School Eye Health Programs

On 6th July 2024, Kalinga Eye Hospital conducted a Stakeholder Meeting in Keonjhar under the National School Eye Health Program, bringing together key decision-makers to review progress and strategize for the upcoming year.

The event saw the participation of 58 stakeholders, including ophthalmic assistants, Block Education Officers, Block Resource Teachers, Inclusive Education (IE) Teachers and the District Education Officer, reflecting the program's commitment to a multi-sectoral approach in tackling childhood vision issues. Organized by Dharendra Kumar Mohanty, Sabita Behera, Sadasiba Behera and Project Coordinator Mr. Pranay Biswal of Kalinga Eye Hospital, the meeting facilitated insightful discussions on best practices, challenges and future strategies.

By engaging with educators and healthcare professionals, the program aims to identify vision issues in school children at an early stage, ensuring timely intervention. The meeting underscored the importance of collaborative efforts to enhance the impact of school eye health programs, paving the way for a future where every child has the right to clear vision and a brighter academic future.





## Primary Eye Screening Centers

### Bringing Eye Care to the door steps of Communities

Kalinga Eye Hospital operates seven Primary Eye Screening Centers, strategically located to bridge the gap between remote communities and specialized eye care services. Two of these centers function within Community Health Centers (CHCs) in Sriramchandrapur and Bhuban, while the remaining centers are located in Khajuriakata (Dhenkanal), Athagarh (Cuttack), Athamallik (Angul), Koshala (Angul) and Kanihan (Angul).

These centers serve as vital access points for individuals who otherwise would have to travel long distances for eye care. The impact is profound 14,908 people have been screened through these centers, with 1,608 identified with cataracts and 994 successfully operated upon. Additionally, 9,867 individuals underwent refraction tests and received corrective glasses, while 11,709 were provided with medical treatment.

These centers ensure that timely diagnosis and treatment prevent minor vision impairments from escalating into severe disabilities. They also serve as educational hubs, raising awareness about eye health and the importance of early intervention. By bringing services closer to home, we empower communities to take charge of their vision health, leading to improved quality of life and productivity.





## Outreach Camps And Overall Impact

### Reaching the Unreached: Transforming Lives Through Eye Screening Camps

In the fight against preventable blindness, accessibility remains a major challenge. Rural populations, particularly the elderly and economically disadvantaged, often lack awareness, resources, or the means to seek eye care services. To bridge this gap, Kalinga Eye Hospital organizes extensive outreach camps, ensuring that vision care reaches those who need it the most.

This year alone, 244 eye screening camps were conducted, screening 29,065 individuals. Of these, 11,854 people were diagnosed with cataracts and 7,881 underwent sight-restoring surgeries, enabling them to reclaim their independence and dignity.

For many, these camps are life-changing. An elderly farmer regains his ability to work, a schoolchild can finally see the blackboard clearly, a mother can look after her family with confidence. These interventions not only restore sight but also livelihoods, education and self-sufficiency.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our supporting partners Sightsavers India, Unite For Sight, DCI and SEVA foundation whose unwavering support enables us to turn our vision into reality. Together, we reaffirm our commitment to eliminating preventable blindness and ensuring that no one is left in the shadows of avoidable vision loss.
